### 3.5 MATRIX LINKING PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES WITH COURSES

First: College requirements.



A. Mandatory college requirement.

- General rights and freedoms (102110):

This course deals with the basic human rights and freedoms established by the Jordanian Constitution of 1952, in comparison with international human rights standards and addresses the basic principles of guaranteeing rights and freedoms by focusing on the principle of separation of the three powers, the principle of respect for human rights and the principle of independence of the judiciary, and explaining the importance of the Constitutional Court in the legal and judicial system. in Jordan.

- Political systems and constitutional law (102111):

This article includes defining the state and explaining its pillars, characteristics, origin, forms, and subjection to the law, then defining the government and explaining its forms. It also includes the general principles of constitutional law, and its relationship with other branches of law. As well as introducing the constitution, and explaining the types of constitutions, how they emerged, and how they ended.

- Public International Law (1) (102112):

This course examines the definition of public international law, its historical development, an explanation of its branches, the process of codifying its rules, as well as the study of its legal nature and the relationship between it and national law and its sources, focusing on the law of international treaties and its persons, especially the state in terms of its origin, its pillars, the theory of its recognition, and its forms.

- Penal Code/General Section (102113):

It includes the definition of the penal law, the general theory of crime, its elements, classification, provisions for attempt and participation in it, the general theory of punishment and precautionary measures, their classification, methods of implementation, reasons for aggravation and mitigation, impediments to punishment, impediments to criminal liability, reasons for permissibility, and expiration of punishment.

- Introduction to the science of law (102121):

This material is considered a necessary introduction for students beginning to study law and is divided into two parts: the general theory of law, which examines the definition of the law, its characteristics, its branches, confiscation and interpretation, the scope of its application and abolition, and the general theory of the right, which deals with the definition of the right, the types of rights, the divisions of the right, and its components. The Internet, its characteristics, and the nature of the transactions that take place are introduced. Through it, and the role of law in regulating it.

- Administrative Law (1) (102211):

This course examines the definition of administrative law and explains its origin, sources, characteristics, and scope. It then examines administrative organization in its central and decentralized forms, the basic elements of



- public facilities, and determines their types, methods of management, administrative control, and the powers granted to these authorities to maintain public order with its four elements.
- Civil Law/Sources of Obligation (102221):  
This article includes the definition of obligation, the real right and the personal right, and the classification of the sources of obligation: the contract, the conditions for its establishment, its elements, the stages of its conclusion, the implementation of the contract, the expiration of the contractual bond, and contractual responsibility. This article includes the study of the unilateral will as a source of obligation, such as the promise of a reward, then It studies the harmful act or illegal act, and the beneficial act (unjust enrichment): its elements and applications such as undeserved seizure, compensation and repayment of the debt of others. Finally, it studies the law as the direct source of obligation, how to express will via the Internet, contracting via the Internet, and contractual and tort civil liability. Through the Internet.
  - Principles of commercial law (102225):  
This course includes a study of the origins and development of commercial law, a study of land-based businesses by virtue of their inherent nature and maritime businesses, the electronic commerce system and how it is applied to commercial businesses, and examines the merchant and the conditions that must be met by him, and his duties in registering in the commercial registry, keeping commercial books, and taking a commercial address. It also discusses the store and its elements, and studies commercial contracts, commercial mortgage, regular agency, commission agency, brokerage, and commercial representation.
  - Law Ethics (102401):  
This course deals with the ethics of legal work by focusing on the concept of the legal profession, the ethical rules and rules of conduct in practicing this profession, the rules of judicial conduct, a statement of the rights and duties of lawyers, professional and behavioral responsibility, disciplinary sanctions, and the place to appeal them.
- B - Compulsory specialization requirements:
- Personal Status Law (102114):  
This course aims to give the student a clear conception of the family, its care, and the rights and duties that result from its establishment, and to explain the meaning of personal status, develop its technology, the principles upon which the marriage system in Islam is based, the definition of marriage and its ruling in Islam and the divine laws, the premises of marriage, polygamy, and types of marriage. And the effects resulting from it, the dowry and its rulings, alimony, divorce and its types, the characteristics of each type, its expressions, divorce, separation between spouses due to discord, conflict, fear of harm, number, lineage, breastfeeding, and custody, and studying the provisions of Sharia law regarding the rights related to the estate after death, and how to distribute the estate to its owners in a manner that is appropriate. With human nature, an introduction to the science of inheritance, and Sharia law is included in the legislation of inheritance, rights related to inheritance, impediments to



- inheritance, the pillars of inheritance and its causes, the principles of issues, restitution, pregnancy inheritance, the lost, the obligatory will, exit, and copying.
- Provisions of electronic commerce (102209):  
This course deals with electronic commerce by studying the electronic commerce system from a general and legal point of view. It includes studying the most important types of electronic commerce contracts and their documentation, electronic payment methods, electronic banking operations and their types, as well as consumer protection from the electronic commerce system, and all of this is within the Jordanian Electronic Transactions Law No. (85) of 2001, as well as model laws issued by the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law
  - Administrative Judiciary (102212):  
This course includes an introduction to the administrative judiciary, a study of its origins and development by explaining the principle of legality and how to ensure its application, and defining the types of oversight over the administration, especially judicial oversight in Jordan in terms of focusing on studying the law of the Supreme Court of Justice, as well as studying its jurisdiction represented in the annulment lawsuit in terms of Defining it, its characteristics, conditions for acceptance, and aspects of cancellation, then ruling on it, as well as the claim for compensation for administrative decisions and the conditions for ruling on it, and addressing the Administrative Judiciary Law No. 27 of 2014 issued based on the constitutional amendments of 2011 AD.
  - Crimes against persons (102214):  
This course examines the crimes that occur against people and affect their lives, health, or safety, such as murder crimes of all kinds, intentional and unintentional, crimes of intentional and unintended harm, abortion crimes, the crime of adultery, as well as crimes against public morals, such as rape and indecent assault, and crimes that affect the freedom of the person. Individuals, such as kidnapping crimes, deprivation of freedom, and crimes against honor and prestige, such as slander, slander, and contempt.
  - Legal research and writing methods (102219):  
This course deals with methods of finding legal information, which are called research methods, through legislation, judicial jurisprudence, and jurisprudential jurisprudence, as well as through various paper and electronic publications. It also addresses how to deal with this information and use it in writing research papers and/or solving legal problems, and also highlighting Highlighting the formal and substantive aspects of legal writing
  - Civil Law (Provisions of Commitment) (102222):  
This course studies the following topics: The effects of obligation in terms of voluntary implementation of the obligation through fulfillment, or compulsory implementation. The lawsuits that guarantee the right of the creditor to preserve his right are studied. Descriptions of the obligation include: condition and term, solidarity



- between creditors and debtors, indivisible obligation, transfer of obligation, transfer of the right debt, expiration of obligation without fulfillment or fulfillment in return through release, impossibility of implementation, passage of time, and electronic fulfillment using means. New communications, including: the Internet.
- Civil Law (Named Contracts) (102223):  
This article deals with the rules for the judge's adaptation of the contracts of sale and lease. It begins by defining the contract of sale, explaining its characteristics and distinguishing it from some similar contracts. It examines the elements of the contract of sale represented by mutual consent and subject matter and the effects of the sale represented by the seller's obligation to transfer ownership, his obligation to deliver, his obligation to guarantee exposure and entitlement, and the buyer's obligation. By paying the price, receiving the merchandise, and bearing the expenses, and how to conclude contracts via the Internet, such as the sale and lease contracts, the lease contract: its definition, characteristics, distinguishing it from other contracts, its elements (satisfaction and subject matter), its effects, the lessor's obligations, the lessee's obligations, and its expiration.
  - Labor Law (102224):  
This course studies the definition of labor law, its relationship with other branches of law, its characteristics, sources, and application, in terms of persons and time. It also studies the employment contract and its types such as: (fixed-term and indefinite-term employment contract, training contract, probationary contract, and collective labor contract) It also examines a statement of the worker's obligations and rights, the employer, wages, settlement of labor disputes, labor rights, inspection, and the International Labor Organization.
  - Administrative Law (2) (102311):  
This article is considered complementary to the previous article (Administrative Law 1) and deals with the public function in terms of clarifying the legal positions of employees, their relationship with public administration, and the rules that govern the civil service. It also deals with administrative decisions in terms of their pillars and elements, types and provisions, their validity, implementation, and termination, as well as administrative contracts, Public funds, and legal means to protect them.
  - Public International Law (2) (102312):  
This subject deals with the rights and duties of states and the state's land, sea and air territory, as well as the law of outer space and the law of the sea. It also deals with the study of international responsibility, and addresses the resolution of international disputes by peaceful means, as well as the study of diplomatic and consular law.
  - Jordanian constitutional system (102314):  
This course is considered complementary to the course (Political Systems and Constitutional Law). This course includes a presentation of the development of political and constitutional life in Jordan, starting with the establishment of the emirate, then the issuance of the Basic Law of (1928), then the Constitution (1946), then the



- Constitution (1952). This course deals with the system of government. The rights and freedoms of citizens and the three authorities in the state, their powers, and the relationship between them.
- Crimes against property (102315):  
This article deals with crimes that occur against money. In this article, these crimes are defined, their scope, differences and similarities between them, and a statement of the comprehensive provisions for these crimes, such as theft crimes: in terms of their elements, the different forms of theft, the crime of fraud, the crime of giving a bad check, and the crime of bad credit, And the crimes attached to it.
  - Law of International Organizations (102319):  
This course examines the general theory of international organizations, the legal personality of organizations, members of international organizations, and international employees, and the powers of international organizations. This course focuses on studying international organizations, such as the League of Nations, focusing on the United Nations, the United Nations, regional organizations, and the Arab League.
  - Civil Law (Real Rights) (102323):  
This article examines the original real rights and the accessory real rights, as it begins by dealing with the real rights, which include the definition of the property right, its characteristics and elements, the scope of its protection, and the restrictions imposed on it. It deals with common ownership, the reasons for gaining ownership, and the rights deriving from the property right, such as the right to dispose of, residential use, exploitation and benefit, and the right to contribute. Monopoly and abstract rights, such as the rights of way, passage, drinking water, streams and streams.  
As for accessory real rights, this article discusses real securities, such as security mortgages, possessory mortgages, and privilege rights.
  - Civil Procedure Code (102324):  
This course includes a study of the definition of the Civil Procedure Code, its sources, and its relationship with other branches of law, then a study of the judicial organization in terms of the formation of the courts, the degrees of litigation, the judiciary, and the rules of jurisdiction. Then the theory of the case is studied in terms of: its definition, conditions, and legal nature, the method of litigation and recourse, and the course of the dispute until it is decided by a ruling decisive for the dispute, along with an explanation of the aspects of appeal to which this ruling is subject: appeal, third party objection, retrial, and cassation.
  - Private International Law (102325):  
This article includes the definition of private international law, its nature and sources, the conflict of laws in electronic transactions, the rules of attribution, the adaptation of the legal relationship with a foreign element, referral and the position of the national judge on the applicable foreign law, and the impediments to the application of the applicable foreign law represented by pushing the public order and circumventing the law. This



- course also includes a study of the conflict of laws in matters of personal status, real and moral rights, and legal actions. It also includes a study of the conflict in international jurisdiction, the domicile and the legal status of foreigners, the conflict of legislative jurisdiction, and the conflict of jurisdiction in electronic transactions and the implementation of foreign judicial rulings.
- Intellectual Property Rights (102328):  
This article includes the definition of intellectual property rights, which are literary and artistic rights, industrial and commercial property rights, patents, trademarks, industrial designs, and utility models, and the protection of these rights at the international and national levels. This study also includes electronic publishing, electronic performance, electronic domain names, and non-public reproduction. Project for rights protected across the Internet, multimedia influencing intellectual rights, and international regulation of Internet and copyright.
  - Evidence Law (102336):  
It includes the concept of judicial proof, the doctrines of proof in terms of their nature, the extent of their investment in legislation, the means of proof specified in the Jordanian Evidence Law, the means of electronic proof, and the extent of their conclusiveness in proof.
  - Electronic management legislation (102338):
  - This course deals with the definition of e-government and its impact on the legal system of public facilities, methods of managing them, and studying the work of electronic public administration, such as (electronic administrative decision, electronic administrative contract), as well as the impact of electronic public administration on the performance of public employees for their work, the advantages and disadvantages of applying electronic public administration, and the most important obstacles. Apply it.
  - Information Technology Crimes (102339):  
This course deals with the criminal protection of electronic transactions in the Jordanian Electronic Crimes Law, electronic data, electronic commerce, computer software crimes, electronic theft, fraud, and credit abuse crimes, as well as the criminal protection of communication networks, electronic networks, trademarks, and electronic signature crimes, as well as a study of international cooperation in the field of combating crimes. Computer and Internet.
  - Legal terms in English (102413):  
This course includes an introduction to the law, an explanation of its origins, development, and confiscation, then an introduction to its branches, a statement of the characteristics of each, and its relationship to other laws, and examines the study of each branch of the law, in the English language.
  - Code of Criminal Procedure (102425):
  - It includes an introduction to the criminal procedure law and the public lawsuit, the personal right lawsuit filed pursuant to it, the theories that govern the criminal principles and procedures, and the stages that the public



lawsuit goes through, which are the stages of investigation, reasoning, preliminary investigation, trial, ways to appeal the criminal rulings and the reasons for their lapse or expiration, as well as criminal jurisdiction to consider the case. The case in terms of place and people...etc.

- Commercial Law / Companies and Bankruptcy (102435):

This course examines commercial companies in general, such as joint-liability companies, limited partnerships, joint-venture companies, public limited joint-stock companies, limited liability companies, partnerships limited by shares, and foreign companies. As for bankruptcy, this article includes a study of bankruptcy and the provisions related to it, its effects, management and confirmation of the bankrupt's assets, the bankruptcy authority, simple settlement and its conditions, rehabilitation, bankruptcy crimes, liquidation, and protective settlement and its conditions.

- Commercial Law/Commercial Papers (102436):

This course includes the definition of commercial papers, their characteristics and historical development, then the study of the bill of exchange from the objective and formal aspects, and the study of the promissory note from the objective and formal aspects and the check in terms of the objective and formal conditions.

- Judicial applications (102460):

This course focuses on the scientific aspect of studying legal theories, as it deals with the basic principles on which the Jordanian judicial system is based, the legal profession, especially the duties and rights of a lawyer, legal advice, litigation agency, friendly claims, and judicial warning. The course is also concerned with teaching the student how to prepare and write lists of claims, various complaints, and pleadings, how to respond to them, present defenses and objections, write summons and various guarantees, requests, and how to respond to them, which deals with how to prepare pleadings, implement judgments, and organize contracts.

The teaching method relies on simplified explanation supported by realistic examples, and on accustoming students to the method of dialogue, discussion, analysis, conducting interviews, pleadings, and writing in sound legal language. Therefore, the student is assigned homework on a permanent basis, and these works are presented and discussed in the classroom. In addition to conducting mock trials and making scientific visits to various courts.

Optional major requirements:

- Environmental Law (102101):

This course deals with the concept of the environment, its importance, and its elements, and an explanation of the most important legislation in the Jordanian national law for environmental protection, as well as crimes committed



against the environment, and learning about international standards for environmental protection, and international institutions related to the environment.

- Alternative Dispute Resolution (102215):

This course deals with civil case management in terms of explaining the concept of civil case management, the definition of case management, the goals and objectives of civil case management, and the tasks and powers of the case management judge. It also deals with arbitration procedures and an explanation of what an arbitration agreement is, who the arbitrators are, the law applicable to the subject of arbitration, and the method of conducting procedures. Arbitration until issuing the arbitration decision and methods of appealing it, the concept of electronic control with clarification, and the implementation of the arbitration decision and electronic implementation. It also discusses the nature of mediation, its importance, types, and the mechanism of its application in the courts.

- Science of the Principles of Jurisprudence (102218):

This article deals with the definition of the science of the principles of jurisprudence: its purpose, topics, and origin, the ruling and sources of legislation, the Book (the Qur'an), its authority and miraculousness, the Sunnah, its authority, and its parts, consensus, its definition, origin, conditions, and types, analogy: its definition, pillars, authority, and conditions, custom: its meaning, types, and the difference between it and consensus, its conditions, and working by it.

- History of the law (102226):

This course deals with a study of the origins of laws and their roles, starting from prehistoric times through the ancient divine rulings of the Greeks and Indians. It also deals with a study of the history of the development of Roman law and the study of Islamic legislation and ends with a study of the general principles of contemporary legal systems.

- Financial and tax legislation (102313):

This course includes the definition of financial law, its characteristics, confiscation, and its relationship with other branches of law. It also includes a study of the general budget law, taxes, customs duties, and the general sales tax.

- Forensic Medicine (102316):

This article deals with the definition of forensic medicine and its importance in detecting deaths, determining their causes to assist investigation and trial, as well as determining the duration of absence from work and illness for the purposes of enabling the court to issue its rulings regarding crimes of abuse.

- Local Administration Law (102317):



This course examines the general principles of local administration in terms of its definition, origin, importance, pillars, and components. It also examines local administration in Jordan in terms of its origin, specializations, how it works, and administrative divisions in the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan.

- Crimes against state security (102321):

This course includes an introduction to crimes against the external security of the state, including crimes of treason, espionage, contact with the enemy for illegal purposes, etc., and crimes against the internal security of the state, such as crimes against the constitution and crimes of usurpation of authority of all kinds, as well as a study of the special procedures stipulated in the law of the State Security Court.

- International Trade Law (102330):

This course includes an introduction to international trade law, its characteristics and components, its persons, and the organizations concerned with it. It also includes a study of one of the international agreements, such as the United Nations Convention on International Sales, which was concluded in (Vienna) in 1980. The course also includes a study of arbitration. In settling disputes in the field of international trade.

- Nationality and Foreigners Status (102333):

This course deals with the general theory of nationality, in terms of its definition, its legal nature, the basic rules upon which it is based, a statement of international standards in dealing with nationality, defining the state's authority in regulating it, the pillars and types of nationality, explaining the methods of acquiring it, and dealing with cases of statelessness, dual or multiple nationalities, and establishing the principle of International criminal liability, its loss, and its recovery. It also addresses the issue of the status of foreigners in the country, determining the rights they enjoy, and their obligations in theory and practice.

- international Criminal Law (102335):

This course deals with the emergence of international criminal law, the concept of international crime, the classification of international crimes, and the statement of temporary and permanent international criminal courts, focusing on the Statute of the International Criminal Court.

- - Implementation Law (102337):

This course deals with the definition of the implementation law, the concept of implementation, the authority that initiates implementation procedures, its conditions, the seizure of movable and immovable funds that are in the hands of a third person, the execution on these funds, putting them up for public auction and selling them, imprisonment of the debtor, the right of lien, and its degrees.

- Diplomatic and Consular Law (102360):

This article addresses the codification of diplomatic and consular work, develops the rules governing diplomatic and consular missions, the historical development of diplomatic relations, addresses the formation of the



- diplomatic mission, its tasks and duties, the statement of diplomatic immunities and privileges, and the termination of the diplomatic mission. It also addresses special missions and accredited diplomatic missions.
- Economic crimes (102371):  
This course deals with the definition of new economic crimes resulting from the development of contemporary legal systems, and the importance of having legal rules that control them, as well as research into economic crime, its scope, criminal liability for it, and the penalties prescribed for it, along with a study of the most important economic crimes in Jordanian legislation and ways to protect them.
  - Insurance contracts (102380):  
It includes the nature of insurance, its historical development, its necessity, how to conclude an insurance contract, the insured, the forms of insurance (compulsory and optional), and the status of persons (insurance against damage, injury, unemployment, death, damages, and insurance against theft, fire, or liability).
  - International Humanitarian Law (102381):  
This course addresses the definition of international humanitarian law, its historical development, and multiple confiscations by focusing on the four Geneva Conventions of 1949 and explaining the important role of the International Red Cross in implementing its rules and the two Additional Protocols of 1977. It shows us the protected categories of civilians, prisoners of war, children, women, and others, and the restrictions imposed on war and prohibited weapons. Places that may not be targeted, mechanisms for implementing it, and the responsibilities resulting from violating its rules, especially before the temporary international criminal courts and the permanent international criminal courts.
  - Criminology and Punishment (102415):  
This course includes the study of criminology and penology, as criminology deals with the study of crime, its history, its connection to the penal code, the factors of criminal behavior, both individual and social, and the various theories that have been developed around these topics.  
As for penology: This course deals with studying the development of the idea of punishment with the development of societies, ancient and modern penal schools, and the foundations of the punitive philosophy related to them, then studying the physical framework for implementing punishment in terms of correctional and rehabilitation centers, their types, and methods of implementing punishment.
  - Maritime Law (102422):  
This course studies the legal system of the ship, its nature, nationality, registration, ownership, and the real rights attached to it, and its seizure. Then it deals with the maritime navigation persons, who are: the ship's owner, its outfitter, its captain, and its navigators. It also studies contracts regulating maritime activity, such as the maritime flag contract, maritime sales contracts, insurance contracts, contracts for ship salvage, and maritime liability in terms of collision, salvage, and maritime insurance.
